



#### UPDATE ON THE MGE GAS INSTALLATION

The natural gas installation continues by Missouri Gas Energy (MGE), but a slower pace than initially planned. They have discovered that the rocks and clay have been a little more daunting than expected. Nonetheless, the project continues.

All main lines in the west side of the city (Greenbriar and west) have been installed. From these main lines, all but a few service lines have been installed to residents' homes. It is our expectation that the reparation of the unsightly "dig spots" will soon begin. This has not begun thus far as they (MGE) wants to have all dig work done before beginning the reparation process, to include yards and streets. As it relates specifically to sod placement, one of our aldermen contacted a turf specialist and learned this is actually the best time of the year to install sod. In fact, sod can be installed all through the winter when necessary. New sod will still need to have thorough moisture in the first four to six weeks. As has been relayed in earlier communications, moisture control will be the responsibility of the homeowner.

MGE is currently making their way down Winged Foot from the CC entrance and will continue south past the golf course entrance, east toward Congressional Circle and on down Oakmont. The installation plans will be like that on the west side by installing the main line first, followed by service line installation up to each residence who has given interest for natural gas.
